

BLUE RIDGE BREWING

MALTA

A hoppy change is coming to the hip town of Malta! At least that's how Bryan and Brianna Shores describe their newest business venture in their beloved hometown. Blue Ridge Brewing, named after a prominent ridge on the ranch where Bryan grew up guiding trophy elk hunts as a kid, is slated to open in the spring of 2018. The brewery was constructed by Bryan, attached to his popular metal sign business. Blue Ridge has established a founders 'mug club,' features rugged tin and copper décor, and, of course, is adorned by antlers galore.

Bear Paw Development's Food and Agriculture Development Center became involved with Blue Ridge when contacted by our partner organization, PhillCo Economic Growth Council, about an ambitious couple seeking assistance to secure financing for a proposed brewery. Shortly thereafter, Bear Paw's FADC set to work with the Shores to develop business financials for their application to the Montana Department of Agriculture's widely popular Growth Through Agriculture grant/ loan program. While developing their financials, the Shores also worked with Bear Paw's Loan Department to secure funds for this start-up venture. Blue Ridge Brewing is sure to be a place for family, friends, neighbors and colleagues to gather in merriment and carry on the tradition of community that makes the Hi-Line such a special place to call home.



B SOCIAL BAR AND LANES

FORT BENTON

The bowling alley in Fort Benton has been a longstanding establishment and has served as a source of fun, entertainment and, most importantly, league bowling for local residents and visitors for many years. In early 2017, Jack's Bar and Lanes went up for sale. This was when a young couple, Trapper and Julie Bowers, decided to take on the property and give it new life as B Social Bar and Lanes.

The Bowers, who have Montana roots, had been living and working in South Carolina for several years when they decided to move to Fort Benton to be closer to family. They had always wanted to start a business of their own and saw a great opportunity in the local bowling alley. Trapper and Julie came to Bear Paw Development to further develop their plans for taking over the business and making it their own. The Bowers also obtained financing for the purchase of the property through Bear Paw's USDA Intermediary Relending Program.

Trapper and Julie renamed the business B Social Bar and Lanes. Not only have they continued the tradition of league bowling, but have extended their hours of operation and expanded their services to include open bowling and a restaurant and lounge.







HAVRE

Through the City of Havre, Bear Paw Development submitted a Community Development Block Grant Public Facilities application for renovations to the Boys and Girls Club of the Hi-Line. The application was successful and the City was awarded \$421,000 in CDBG funds. Upon award, Bear Paw helped the City of Havre and the Boys and Girls Club procure SMA Architects and Clausen and Sons Construction to complete the renovations.

The renovation is addressing several critical facility needs, including a reroof of the west wing, installation of energy efficient windows, construction of a staff bathroom, installation of a fire alarm and intercom system, and renovations to the gym.

Construction began in October 2017 and will be complete in early 2018.




HARLEM WASTEWATER PROJECT REWARDS PATIENCE AND PERSISTENCE

The City of Harlem has been working on a solution to their wastewater problem for more than eight years, and due to the severity of these difficulties, received multiple violations from the State of Montana. In 2011, Montana's Renewable Resource Grant and Loan Program awarded Harlem a \$100,000 grant; in 2013, Montana's Treasure State Endowment Program followed up with a \$625,000 grant; and in 2015, USDA-Rural Development awarded the community a very generous funding package consisting of \$2.9 million in grant funds and \$1.2 million in loan funds. This resulted in the project being financed with approximately 80% in grant funds, thus allowing the city to keep a necessary rate increase to a minimum.


Following a successful sludge removal project in 2013, construction began on the main project in the fall of 2016. The project consisted of construction of a large storage lagoon, spray irrigation system, sludge disposal, and upgrades to two lift stations and the treatment plant building. The project was deemed Substantially Complete in August 2017, and Harlem is currently working to determine the best solution to remove the remaining sludge. Bear Paw Development is pleased to have been an integral partner in this effort.

HAVRE

Jennifer Forsyth was born and raised in Havre, and now has her own practice, Hi-Line Law, PLLC, in the Havre community. She has been practicing for eight years.

Jennifer worked alongside another lawyer for several years before purchasing the practice. Bear Paw Development was able to assist Jennifer with financing the purchase through its Revolving Loan Fund Program. Jennifer offers services in estate planning, corporate and business law, buy-sells and other real estate transactions, landlord and tenant actions, probates, civil litigation, and collections.

Located at 410 Third Avenue in Havre, the Hi-Line Law, PLLC property originally served as a gas station many years ago and underwent cleanup with the assistance of the Montana State Petrofund in 2007. Not only has Jennifer maintained a thriving law practice, but her office building is an excellent example of a successful brownfields redevelopment project. Hi-Line Law, PLLC provides a much needed service to the area, is locally owned and operated, and retains three jobs for the Havre community.



HAVRE

Harold Blake Whitford, Jr. envisioned opening his own salon when he graduated from cosmetology school. That vision became a reality when he and his mother, Melody Bernard-Whitford, purchased Elite Tan & Style in 2016. Located in Havre's Holiday Village Mall, they changed the name to HM Salon & Spa. HM Salon provides all hair services, including Brazilian Keratin Treatment, the only salon in the area certified for that service. HM Salon also offers tanning, full body waxing, as well as professional makeup application.

In 2017, Bear Paw's Small Business Development Center assisted the Whitfords in fine tuning their business plan and helped with financial projections for a grant application to the Indian Equity Fund from the Montana Department of Commerce. They were awarded funding later in the year to purchase new equipment. Harold and Melody continue to grow their business, offering new services to a wide area of northern Montana.
